**Timothy Cohen-Mitchell (M.Ed. 1993)** has been named the 1999 Certified Entrepreneurship Teacher of the Year by the National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship. Cohen-Mitchell is the co-founder and director of the Young Entrepreneurs Society (YES), a program that teaches at-risk and low-income teens how to start and operate their own small businesses. YES is a program of the Orange (Massachusetts) Revitalization Partnership, which receives support from a range of community and business organizations in Franklin County. Cohen-Mitchell is currently a doctoral candidate in the School of Education, working

in the area of international education.

**Jennifer Ladd (Ed.D. 1995)** is working as a consultant on issues of wealth and class. Through her Northampton, Massachusetts, business, Class Action, she consults and runs classes that explore the psychological and social dimensions of wealth and power. She also advises individuals on ways to create their own charitable giving plans and organizes "cross-class dialogue" groups that bring together wealthy people and working-class people to share their life experiences and hear each other's perspectives.

**Donna J. S. Lynch (Ed.D. 1998)** received the National Student Research Award for 1998 from the National Academic Advising Association.

**Michele T. Grab (M.Ed. 1999)** has received national recognition with two recent awards. She was named Outstanding Graduate Student in Massachusetts in 1998 by the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Region I, and in 1999 she received the National Association of Women in Education (NAWE) Advancing Women in Higher Education Conference Graduate Student Presentation Award.
